Title IV, Part B: 21st Century Community Learning Centers

San Diego City Schools’ 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) grant provides funds for the district’s “6 to 6” Extended School Day Programs at 31 schools:

Children attending non-profit private schools located within the enrollment area of any of the 31 schools receiving 21st CCLC funds are eligible to apply for enrollment in the San Diego City Schools’ “6 to 6” Extended School Day Programs. Non-profit private schools were also eligible to apply for the California Department of Education (CDE) 21st CCLC grant funds, to develop their own programs.

Identification of Students

The demand for services in San Diego’s “6 to 6” Extended School Day Program exceeds program capacity at most schools. Therefore, an application and enrollment process was developed to allow students attending non-profit private schools located within the enrollment boundaries of the 31 schools equal access to the program. Non-profit private schools are encouraged to refer to the San Diego Unified School District Elementary School Boundaries Map (*see Attachment 1*), or to contact the district’s School of Attendance Boundaries Department at (619) 725-5668 or via e-mail at www.sandi.net, to determine eligibility. The rating system below is used to identify families of greatest need and to create a priority list. Highest priority is given to students that accumulate the most points.

- Eligibility for Free or Reduced Cost Meals = 1 point
- All parents/guardians living with the child are employed full-time (40 hrs/wk) or are full-time students (12 units) = 1 point
- Child(ren)’s school recommended them for academic assistance = 1 point

District Services/Products

San Diego’s “6 to 6” Extended Day Program provides students a safe and educational environment before and/or after school for elementary and middle school students. The “before school” program provides services for 1.5 to 2 hours per day. The “after school” program provides services for a minimum of 3 hours per day, until at least 6:00 p.m. The program is designed to serve:

- Elementary – average of 83 students per school, per day (15:1 student-staff ratio)
- Middle – average of 111 students per school, per day (20:1 student-staff ratio)

Program activities include an academic component for 60 to 90 minutes consisting of academic instruction, homework assistance and tutorial support. The enrichment component provides students with access to activities such as arts and crafts, theatre, sports, etc. All students participating in the after school program receive one snack per day.

Timeline for Delivery of District Services/Products

San Diego’s “6 to 6” Extended School Day Program services will begin in September 2005. The academic component of the program will begin in October and continue for a minimum of 25 weeks.

Delivery Logistics of District Services/Products

San Diego's "6 to 6" Extended School Day Programs are delivered at the 31 school sites before and/or after the regular school day. Through a contract agreement with the district, the City of San Diego has agreed to provide program oversight and to subcontract with non-profit community-based organizations such as Harmonium, San Diego Reads, Social Advocates for Youth and the YMCA. Principals at the 31 school sites design the academic component in collaboration with the provider agencies. Principals select a minimum of two credentialed teachers and coordinate teachers' activities, curriculum, homework assistance and/or structured academic instruction. Students from non-profit private schools must provide their own transportation.

Academic Assessment of District Services and Impact (if any) on Improvement to Title I Services

An external firm provides program evaluation services. Results of this assessment and feedback from principals and teachers are reviewed each year and used to make program improvements.

Size/Scope of Resources Allocated by District to Deliver Services/Products

The 21st CCLC annual funding allocation is based on a reimbursable rate:

- **Before School Programs** (2 hours): \$3.33 per day, per student
Elementary: \$25,000 max.* (approx. 42 students per day)
Middle/Junior High: \$33,000 max.* (approx. 55 students per day)
- **After School Programs**: \$5.00 per day, per student
Elementary: \$75,000 max.* (approx. 83 students per day)
Middle/Junior High: \$100,000 max.* (approx. 111 students per day)

Students attending Title I school-wide schools or students attending schools that serve a high percentage of students from low-income families (at least 40% of students qualify to receive free or reduced-cost meals through the National School Lunch Program under the U.S. Department of Agriculture) are eligible. Determination of Private School Children from Low-Income Families

Children attending non-profit private schools located within the enrollment area of any of the 31 district schools receiving 21st CCLC funds are eligible to apply for enrollment in San Diego City School's "6 to 6" Extended School Day Programs. Non-profit private schools were also eligible to apply for CDE 21st CCLC grant funds to develop their own programs. Student enrollment will be based on the criteria previously outlined in the Student Identification section of this document.

District Services for Teachers and Families

*Additional funds are available based on a formula set by CDE. This only applies to schools that exceed an average school size, and number of students enrolled during the regular school day exceeds 600 for elementary or 900 for middle/junior high.
