He teaches graduate and undergraduate courses in media law, ethics, and politics at the University of Texas, where he has been a faculty member since completing his Ph.D. in 1992 on media law and ethics in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Minnesota. Prior to his academic career, Jensen worked as professional journalist for a decade.
